SUMMARY

Katha believes that clear goals and a structured approach will enable us to best deliver results. Through KHEL and the work it entails, Katha tries to track individual child performance and attendance across centres and defines focus areas for implementing initiatives.

While Katha's impact is most accurately defined by the stories scattered through and by its various programmes, here are a few key moves that we made in the last six months:

#### RESEARCH AND DOCUMENTATION

In the last lap of our research, and still in the process of finding out the answers to questions we started with, the last six months saw the end of the first phase of data collection and the beginning of the data analysis. Now we will follow the children to the next grade in school and see the impact of early childhood education.

#### NETWORKING AND POLICY LEVEL INTERACTIONS

The significant engagement with policy makers through a series of discussions led to:

- 1. The Katha Colloquium on Child Poverty and the Mega Cities
- 2. A Roundtable Discussion on 'Whose Education Is It Anyway?', as the teachers and schools debated the Right to Education
- 3. Focus Group Discussions with the youth and the women on their communities

#### COMMUNITY MOBILIZATION AND REVITALIZATION

Katha's SHE]2 initiative ensures access to Safe Water and Sanitation, Health and Housing,

Education and Economic Resurgence. Through various welfare societies, Katha initiated a unique process of empowerment with women as community leaders, focusing on democratic decision-making within the community.

#### THE I LOVE READING CAMPAIGN

The success of first phase of the ILR programme inspired Katha to undertake the challenge again, after repeated requests from the MCD school authorities. This year Katha is focusing on overall school transformation to have a long-term impact by including MCD teachers along with students in this programme.

#### PUBLISHING PROGRAMME

8 books were planned to be completed by March 2011, out of which three are brightening up the new-releases sections of the various bookstores. They are available in both English and Hindi. The others have gone off to illustrators and the translations have been done. Two new titles will be released around Christmas.

# Head and Hands On

#### EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION IMPACT STUDY

In the last six months, the KHEL centre continued its work on the Early Childhood Education Impact Study. The objectives of this study were -

- To assess the impact of early childhood education (ECE) on the performance of children
- To see how early childhood education can help prevent children from dropping out of school

The sample for the study was taken from MCD schools; these are government-run schools which generally cater to children coming from the financially disadvantaged sections of the society. Some of these schools also have Katha's I Love Reading Programme implemented in them.

This study is being done in two phases. The first phase studied children in class 1 and in phase two the same children will be studied after a year's gap. These children will be looked at keeping the following parameters in mind -

Story listening skills | Reading skills | Pre-writing skills | Numerical Skills | Readiness to stay in school

The sample of the study is as follows;

The last six months saw the end of the first phase of the study and the beginning of the second phase.





For the phase one of the study, the following tasks were completed:

#### COMPLETION OF DATA COLLECTION FOR PHASE 1

The research team visited schools to collect attendance and retention information of the children and to interview the teachers.

#### **CODING**

The key steps during the process of coding are explained below:-

- Keeping a record of the number of worksheets
- Sorting the worksheets
- Preparing the code lists: Code lists are prepared for the pre-writing component as well as for the teachers' interview
- Checking or Auditing: The worksheets are checked to see if the instructions were followed properly
- Assigning serial numbers to worksheets: This unique ID given to each worksheet represents characteristics of the child like the school he or she goes to, his or her gender etc.

## DATA ENTRY/DATA PUNCHING DATA CHECKING FOR ACCURACY BEGINNING OF ANALYSIS

The preliminary analysis of the data indicates that the children who have had an experience in formal early childhood education generally do better in many of the tasks than the children who have not had early childhood education experience.

#### PHASE TWO

In the 2nd phase of the study, the children who were studied in class 1 are now followed up to class 2. The Performance, Attendance and Retention (or PAR) of the children will be looked at again, to see if the impact of early childhood education is evident even after a year of formal schooling.

For the phase two of the study, following tasks have been undertaken:

#### DEVELOPMENT OF TOOLS OF DATA COLLECTION:

Assessment tools are being developed to look at the PAR of children. These tools will be based on the same parameters which were looked at in phase one. However, they will be upgraded to the level of the child's current age that is, 6-7 years.

#### **BEGINNING OF DATA COLLECTION:**

The data collection of this phase began soon after the children rejoined the schools following their summer vacations, as the attendance-related data collection has begun.

# NETWORKING AND POLICY LEVEL Making room for dialogue

#### FOCUS GROUP DISCUSSIONS

8th April 2010

#### YOUTH AND WOMEN SPEAK, FORUM-I

World-wide, the impact of urbanization, industrialization, population growth, poverty, environmental degradation and the constant dumping of toxic waste into the atmosphere, waterways and soil, is changing the opportunity for children to participate fully and freely in urban life. If having rich local environmental experiences are universal indicators of quality of life, then what better place to start than to evaluate these mega cities through the lives and eyes of its children? To do the very same Katha organized a discussion with the children of the Katha Lab School, situated in Govindpuri, one of the largest slum clusters in Delhi to share their thoughts, views and aspirations.

The discussion was taken up regarding what they liked and disliked about their communities, what they wish to change, who is responsible and whom to approach.

#### YOUTH AND WOMEN SPEAK, FORUM-II

The other marginalized and vulnerable segment consists of the women from the disadvantaged population. They are the primary caregivers and most often the primary breadwinners of their families. Their problems and situations deeply impact the living environment of the family in which their children are growing. To hear the voices that are the most repressed and to share their perspectives on the city and the way it treats them, Katha brought together women from various communities for a half a day discussion. The women participated in this forum with a lot of enthusiasm and confidently voiced various concerns. A change for the better is what all the women said was the need of the hour and are actively striving towards its realization.





#### CHILD POVERTY AND THE MEGA CITY

A Katha Colloquium

10th April 2010

India is indeed shining! Yet the dense black cloud that we all can see is the state of urban poverty in India. The nature of urban poverty poses different problems of housing and shelter, water, sanitation, health, education, social security and livelihood along with special needs of the most vulnerable group, the children.

To find and understand from the well established the answers to the unanswered questions; Katha organized a half a day colloquium on "The Child and the Mega City", supported by BvLF.

The consultations aimed to look at all aspects that affect the growth of children, particularly their education and life-long learning.

The discussion came to a close with a formation of a co-operative alliance between the institutions to work with and towards the issues of child poverty in the mega cities.

#### THE JOY OF READING WEEK

31st August – 9th September 2010

To celebrate 22 years of Katha's engagement in the field of education, equity and poverty alleviation and the successful completion of two years into the innovative 'I Love Reading Campaign,' Katha rejoiced the success of all the children and their communities during the Joy of Reading Week from Aug 31 to Sept 9, 2010.

Katha hosted a roundtable discussion, wherein the city teachers and schools debated the Right to Education. A poster competition was also organized around the theme 'Whose Education is it Anyway?' to put forth the powerful ideas of children in paint. Students from various private and MCD schools were invited. The reading week also saw a number of book launches and workshops at various Katha and MCD schools.



## A Body Workshop was launched by the Chief Minister of Delhi, Ms Sheila Dikshit, at the KATHA GENDER RESOURCE CENTRE, supported by Mission Convergence. The CM graciously visited Katha's Gender Resource Centre to speak to our women on what it means to be empowered. The Chief Minister also distributed sanitary napkins to young girls and women. This was a part of the 45 day celebration of all things feminine!

## COMMUNITY REVITALIZATION

Water and sanitation needs calls for joint action by the community people. A number of water and sanitation societies have been formed by our fieldworkers and are now running as self-sustained empowered bodies in all the camps within which our schools are situated. They have periodic meetings and workshops to increase efficiency and affectivity.

These societies, with the help of our students, file regular petitions/applications to local government bodies/institutions for addressing local problems of the community. With constant motivation and intensive, Katha has been successful in making a number of groups self-reliant. They are working towards formation of larger cooperatives and empowering themselves.

#### THE WORK ENTAILED:

- Health Camps These camps are involved in bringing better health to the community.
- Nutrition camps Nutrition camps spread awareness about balanced diet etc.
- Legal Camps The legal camps organize regular seminars on issues like Rights, Litigation etc.
- Self Help Groups For improving women's/men's access to credit for generation of further employment, asset creation, asset redemption and tiding over consumption/social consumption needs and move towards self-reliance.
- Spreading awareness about various government schemes.
- Vocational Training To train women in various vocations such as tailoring, embroidery, bakery etc and help them build profitable business modules and entrepreneurship programmes.

# THE LOVE REA CAMPAIGN

### WITH 50 MUNICIPAL CORPORATION SCHOOLS

#### SCHOOL TRANSFORMATION PROJECT [ILR-STEP]

Concerned about the serious dropout rate of children from the underserved communities in urban Delhi, Katha at the invitation of the Delhi government initiated the "I LOVE READING" programme to bring better reading skills to students in 50 MCD Schools. Based on the learning from this work, Katha proposed a school transformation concept to MCD that includes four important elements - Classroom, Curriculum, Continuous Assessment and Community School Link. The methodology is to work with teachers so that they do these activities on their own, thus enhancing their ability to carry this forward in successive years.

#### HIGH POINTS

 The ILR STeP began in the month of April 2010 with planning for the entire programme, selection of reading mentors, followed by May to June orientation, and training.

- This year, one and a half months of training was given to the selected reading mentors.
- They were trained on Katha's Philosophy, Pedagogy Tools, Story Pedagogy, S.P.I.C.E, R.U.C.H.I, Vidduniya, Lesson Plan, Cluster Teaching, P.A.R, League formation, Conducting Championships, Forming Community-School Link and Reporting Process.
- Hands on training was imparted on developing teaching-learning material/aids based on Katha reading kits - "Moon Kit", "Hulgul ka Pitara" and "Easy Reader" books.
- After this training, the work was started with 50 MCD schools in the underserved areas of south Delhi from July 2010.





#### THE PROCESS OF LEAGUE FORMATION

- First stage of league formation began in the third week of July.
- The first step was identifying 10 students from class 5 i.e. 10 Delhi One Youth Team (DOYTs), each of the ten students then had to select 4 students from their class.
- Each group of five students chose 5 students from class 4 in their league and then 5 students from class 3, 2 and 1 respectively.
- By this process each league finished with a total of 25 students from classes 1 to 5.



#### CHAMPIONSHIP

The ILR championship has been designed to assess the children in their comprehension, speaking, listening, reading, storytelling and writing skills. It has been designed keeping in mind the R.U.C.H.I goal i.e. Reading, Understanding, Comprehension, Holistic, and Intuitive.

The first league match was designed as a part of the Reading Week (6th to 9th September 2010). This was conducted in 8 MCD schools as a pilot programme which would further be implemented in the rest of the 42 schools. The activities conducted were theatre workshop, role play, writing messages, art work done by students on the folk art forms.

The three-day workshop aimed at providing a common platform to word and image storytellers for creative dialogue, to explore new kinds of art in Indian children's literature, ways of seeing from a child's eye, share best practices and learn from each other's experiences. With editorial and design inputs from Katha, and distinguished experts in the field, the workshop helped illustrators and writers to excite and engage a child-reader visually and otherwise, and we hope it to be the first step in the creation of storybooks that we all want our children to read.







#### THE KATHA CHITRAKALA AWARD 2009 LAUREATES

After a year of hunting and an array of stellar artworks, Katha announced the winners for the Katha Chitrakala Award 2009. The grand ceremony took place on the 11th of August at Alliance Française, New Delhi.

The shortlist was released by our international jury, comprising of the renowned illustrators Ms. Sujata Singh, Mr. Christopher Corr, Mr. Gurmeet Singh and the much loved children's book writer Ms. Geeta Dharmarajan. They had a difficult time going over the entries and selecting the longlist and finally the laureates that gave us our winners and the merit list.

Rajiv Eipe won the Grand Prize for his illustrations for the story Dinosaur-Long-As-127-Kids and Paula Bossio and Durga Bai were adjudged Runners up for their stories Ball Heaven and Mai and her Friends respectively.

The event brought luminaries from the field of children's literature coming together and sharing their experiences. The suspense and celebration undoubtedly created another magical Chitrakala and a spectacular event.






